#### **Build With Us**


Governor Lee's proposed FY24 budget recommends providing a general fund transfer of approximately \$3.3 billion to the Department of Transportation to help fund critical transportation projects in both rural and urban areas of the state. The governor's proposed Transportation Modernization Act asks for the ability to partner with the private sector to deliver congestion relief projects\* in urban areas and expand our opportunities to use alternative delivery methods across the state.

The proposed additional funding would provide a comprehensive approach to the state's increasing critical challenges to infrastructure including: significant investments in major urban and rural congestion,\* accelerating IMPROVE Act projects, increasing investments in infrastructure maintenance required to meet the demands of increasing costs and leveraging local participation on projects that connect state highways to local communities. The remaining \$300 million will go straight to counties to support local transportation needs through the State Aid Program.
